It explores the notion of fact vs belief and using the idea of rules to explain how religious and philosophical ideas still exert a strong influence upon our modern justice system in the United Kingdom.</p> <p>Assessment: Knowledge quiz and creative task to demonstrate understanding.</p>	<p>Topic: Life After Death Overview To begin Year 8 students will complete an exploration of ideas surrounding the afterlife. Students then dissect each of the Five Pillars in detail, attempting to understand their application to life for Muslims in modern Britain. We then examine the idea of jihad within Islam, the significance of lesser and greater jihad and the understanding of divergent opinions surrounding jihad within Islam.
